





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# Clinical Practice Guidelines for the Management of Basal Cell Carcinoma in Gorlin Syndrome

**Summary**: A newly published set of national clinical guidelines expands the management of Gorlin syndrome beyond dermatologic treatment, emphasizing the role of psychological wellbeing, patient advocacy, and interdisciplinary collaboration in improving long-term outcomes.

### Clinical Practice Guidelines for the Management of Basal Cell Carcinoma in Gorlin Syndrome

A new manuscript, Clinical Practice Guidelines for the Management of Basal Cell Carcinoma in Gorlin Syndrome, has been submitted to the Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology (JAAD). Gorlin syndrome, a rare genetic disorder linked to mutations in PTCH1 or SUFU, produces a lifelong tendency toward multiple basal cell carcinomas. Beyond its biological complexity, the condition carries a visible and often stigmatizing burden that can reshape one's sense of identity. Recurrent growths and the surgeries required to manage them can leave lasting effects that extend beyond the body to affect mood and social wellbeing.

Of the many specialists who took part, Rahn Kennedy Bailey, MD represented psychiatry, adding a perspective often missing in dermatologic discourse. His involvement underscores a crucial but often overlooked dimension of dermatologic disease: the psychological cost of chronic visibility. Through this lens, the guidelines extend beyond procedural accuracy or therapeutic efficacy, inviting clinicians to consider the interplay between body and mind in the lived experience of illness. Dr. Bailey's input helped shape recommendations that view each patient within the full context of their physical and emotional experience.

This integrative effort is evident throughout the guidelines. The recommendations encourage structured counseling, patient advocacy, and shared decision making as integral elements of effective care. Rather than treating emotional recovery as ancillary, the guidelines position it alongside physical treatment outcomes, suggesting that wellbeing encompasses more than just histologic clearance. This approach resonates with broader debates in contemporary medicine regarding the need to bridge somatic and psychological care, particularly in diseases that alter appearance or social interaction.

The issues raised in the context of Gorlin syndrome point toward wider clinical and ethical

considerations. Visible or chronic conditions often expose patients to subtle forms of stigma, anxiety, and identity disruption that can compound physical suffering. Such experiences are not easily measured, yet they frequently shape adherence, satisfaction, and long-term prognosis. For patients from historically marginalized backgrounds, these challenges may intersect with systemic inequities in access to dermatologic care and the persistent underrepresentation of darker skin tones in clinical research and education. These disparities reveal how illness experience is structured not only by biology but also by culture, economics, and institutional visibility, areas that psychiatry and social medicine are uniquely positioned to address.

This panel's work reflects more than an update in clinical practice. It illustrates how guideline development can bridge disciplines while also addressing long-standing inequities in care. The inclusion of psychiatric insight invites clinicians to consider the emotional and cultural dimensions of illness, particularly for Black patients whose skin tones and lived experiences have too often been overlooked in dermatology. The result is a step towards a more meaningful model of care, one that fully incorporates patients' psychological wellbeing.
